Timetables

- Your exam timetables will be given out to you in advance
- They will tell you the time of your exam, the room you are in and, most importantly, the exams you are taking

- Exams will also show on your daily Arbor calendar and your parents can download a copy of your full timetable from the Arbor parent app. Check this regularly as I can change rooms/seats as things crop up

Your exam paper – the front cover

- Check the front of your exam paper carefully...
- Is it the paper you were expecting?
- Is the tier correct (for maths, science and MFL papers)?
- If you notice something wrong, it is **YOUR** responsibility to say something.
- Put you hand up and speak to an invigilator immediately if you notice something wrong. This includes having the correct access arrangements.

Once you leave the exam room, it is too late to do anything about it!

What to bring into your exam

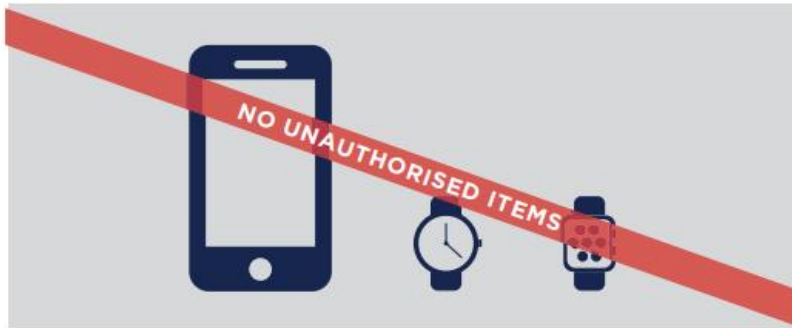
- You can bring your stationery loose or in a clear pencil case
- You are allowed a clear drinks bottle with water inside. If bringing in a bottle from a shop with a wrapper around it, then this wrapper must be removed
- **You will need a black ballpoint pen. All exam boards insist on this. No gel pens or other colours are allowed**
- A highlighter can be used but can only be used in the question
- You can bring any other exam stationery allowed for that specific exam. For example a calculator or protractor

What NOT to bring into your exam

- You will see the posters displayed outside every exam room with the items not allowed in an exam room. These include:
 - Earphones or earbuds (e.g. AirPods)
 - Mobile phones
 - MP3/4 players or similar devices
 - Watches
 - Tablets (e.g. iPads or iPods)
 - Smart glasses
 - Any other smart devices

Malpractice – What is malpractice?

- Malpractice is any practice which is a breach of the JCQ regulations (and there are many!), or which compromises the integrity of any qualification or the validity of an examination, result or certificate
- All malpractice MUST be reported to the exam board and there WILL be a consequence
- It is worthwhile having a think about this before your exams so that you are clear of the expectations and the potential consequences of any breach

Malpractice – Some examples

- Having unauthorised material on your person after the invigilator announcement and not handing it over. For example a phone in your pocket or wearing a watch
- Communicating or attempting to communicate with another candidate
- Poor behaviour
- Plagiarism
- Using AI and not declaring it
- Graffitiing of an exam paper – this includes swear words and doodling, as well as offensive, obscene or discriminatory content
- Discussing/sharing exam content on social media

Malpractice – the consequences

- The awarding bodies issue penalties – it is not the school's decision. These can include:
 - A warning
 - Loss of all marks for a section
 - Loss of all marks for a component
 - Loss of all the marks for a unit
 - Disqualification from a unit
 - Disqualification from all units in one or more qualifications taken during the exam series
 - Disqualification from the whole qualification
 - Disqualification from all qualifications taken in that exam series

THINK ABOUT THE CONSEQUENCES AND WHAT THAT COULD MEAN FOR YOU

Malpractice – mobile phones

- Mobile phones are our biggest issue at KBA
- They **MUST** be switched off and left in your bag. If you have forgotten to put it in your bag then tell an invigilator immediately – **BEFORE** the exam begins
- Having a mobile phone on your person, **even if it is switched off**, will have a consequence. JCQ have a **ZERO TOLERANCE** policy when it comes to mobile phones

Invigilators

- It is the invigilator's job to ensure the integrity of the exam process – they make sure all the rules are being followed
- They are there to make sure you are safe and well and they can help answer any questions you have about the exams
- They cannot help you with the content of the exam paper but can help with anything on the front cover
- Please **respect** these members of staff who are there to make sure your exams run smoothly

On your exam day

This checklist will help you to be as prepared as possible for your exams so that you can focus on doing your best on the day.

Before sitting your exams, ensure you know:

- ☐ the date, time and location of each of your exams. You might find it helpful to write this information in a calendar or planner.
- ☐ who to contact at school or college in case there's an emergency that makes you late or unable to sit your exam.

What you will need:

- ☐ a clear pencil case
- ☐ at least two black ink pens – blue pens are **not acceptable**
- ☐ an approved calculator for relevant exams
- ☐ appropriate apparatus, such as a ruler or protractor, for relevant exams
- ☐ a clear water bottle if you wish to take one in. It **must not** have a label

Contingency sessions:

- ☐ There are contingency sessions within the Summer 2026 exam timetable on the morning and afternoon of 24 June 2026. Make sure you are available on 24 June 2026.

What you cannot take into your exams:

- ☐ any type of phone
- ☐ revision notes
- ☐ any type of watch (this includes analogue, digital and smart watches)
- ☐ smart devices (e.g. AirPods, smart glasses or tablets)



Other important information:

- ☐ Listen carefully to the invigilator's instructions, which will be specific to your exam. If you are unsure of anything, please raise your hand and wait for the invigilator to respond.
- ☐ Fill in your details on the front of your answer booklet.
- ☐ If you need an additional answer sheet, raise your hand and wait for an invigilator to provide one. Remember to add your details to this sheet.
- ☐ If you need to use the toilet or feel unwell, raise your hand and wait for an invigilator to escort you from the exam room.
- ☐ Remember to stay silent – talking to a fellow candidate could result in disqualification from all your exams.

Access Arrangements

- You will already know if you have an approved exam access arrangement. It is your responsibility to make sure you have this in place at the start of the exam.

Movement passes and 5 minute passes are NOT approved access arrangements and do not count in exams

Fire safety

 - If your exam is in the main building, you will go out the front entrance and wait on the grass area

Information for candidates – AI and Assessments

What is AI?

- AI stands for artificial intelligence and using it is like having a computer that thinks
- AI tools like ChatGPT or Snapchat My AI can write text, make art and create music by learning from data from the internet, but watch out – they can also make things up and be biased

Information for candidates AI (Artificial Intelligence and assessments)

What is AI?

AI stands for artificial intelligence and can be used to create text, images, videos, music and artwork based on instructions given to an AI tool.



What is an AI tool?

AI tools are applications, such as ChatGPT, Snapchat My AI, Google and Google translate. There are many more!*

When can I use AI?



- Your teachers may use it in class when teaching the course, but remember teaching in the classroom is not an exam!
- There are some assessments where you can use AI – your teachers will tell you if you can or cannot use an AI tool.
- Remember, the rules are different for different assessments and subjects, so always check with your teachers first!
- When an AI tool is allowed, **you must acknowledge**** the AI tools and the material produced by the AI tool that you have used in your work. If you do not acknowledge AI use, it will be **considered as cheating**.

When can I not use an AI tool?



- AI tools cannot be used in an exam or any other assessment where exam rules apply.
- This is what exam boards call **AI misuse and is a form of cheating**.

**Acknowledgment – When producing a piece of work, if you use the same wording as a published source, you must place quotation marks around the passage and state where it came from. This is known as referencing. You must make sure that you give detailed references for everything in your work which is not in your own words, for example, ChatGPT 3.5 (<https://openai.com/blog/chatgpt/>). 25/01/2025.

IF YOU USE AN AI TOOL, YOU CANNOT GET MARKS FOR WHAT THE AI TOOL HAS PRODUCED, AS IT IS NOT YOUR OWN WORK

If I'm allowed to use AI, how is this breaking the rules?



- AI misuse is when you use an AI tool in an exam or assessment where you are not allowed to, and/or
- Where you use an AI tool to create work and then say it's your own.

How to make sure you don't misuse AI

DECLARE

- Remember to sign your declaration form when handing in your work for final assessment.
- Your signature on the declaration form tells your teacher and the exam board that you are saying all the work you're handing in is your own.
- If you have used an AI tool, **you must declare***** that you have used it before signing the declaration form!

***Declare – this means that when you submit your work for marking, the awarding body will normally require you to sign an authentication statement confirming that you have read and followed the regulations.

ACKNOWLEDGE

If you are allowed to use an AI tool in your assessment (remember to check!), you must do the following:

- reference the AI tool you have used
- give the date of when the AI tool generated the content
- give details of how you used it.
- save screenshots of what you have asked or instructed the AI tool to do and what answer the AI gave you, and include this with the work submitted.

How can AI be misused in assessments?

- AI misuse is when you take something made by AI and say it's your own work.

Know the rules!

- You're not allowed to use AI tools when you're in an exam
- Your teachers will tell you if you're allowed to use AI tools when doing your coursework – the rules will depend on your qualification
- Even if you're allowed to use AI tools, you can't get marks for content just produced by AI – your marks come from showing your own understanding and producing your own work

Reference reference reference!

If you're allowed to use AI tools, you must reference them clearly

- Name the AI tool you used
- Add the date you generated the content
- Explain how you used it
- Save a screenshot of the questions you asked and the answers you got



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Declare it's all your own work

- When you hand in your assessment, you have to sign a declaration
- Anything without a reference must be all your own work
- If you've used an AI tool, don't sign the declaration until you're sure you've added all the references



What happens if I misuse AI?

If you've misused AI, you could lose your marks for the assessment – you could even be disqualified from the subject.

DON'T RISK IT!



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REMEMBER

Misusing AI is cheating!

Know the rules

Talk to your teachers

Reference clearly



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Finally...

- Remember, this is **YOUR** exam, **YOUR** future
- Don't worry about what other students are or are not doing. None of that will be relevant to you in a few years time
- Think about what these exams mean to you. Revise as best you can, use your time efficiently and, most importantly, ask for help if you need it.
